## WAR DIARIES, C.A.S.F.

### Instructions for Compilation and Despatch

1. A War Diary is **SECRET**.
2. The War Diary takes the place of the Historical Record when on active service. (K.R. Can. Para. 1530). Its objects are: to supply authentic material for the history of the unit, and of the force; to furnish a historical record of operations; and to provide data upon which to base improvements in training, equipment, organization and administration.
3. Unless otherwise ordered, the original and duplicate copies are sent on the first day of the succeeding month, through the usual channels, to the A.G., 2nd Echelon, wherever that office may be. The triplicate copy may be held by the unit for three months and then forwarded, also through the usual channels, to A.G., 2nd Echelon.
4. Post-war disposal will be as under:
  - Original—retained at Ottawa for historical purposes.
  - Duplicate—to British Record Office for historical purposes.
  - Triplicate—to unit for custody with unit records.
5. The War Diary will be entered up daily on M.F.M. 11 and rendered monthly in triplicate (Mobn. Instr. for C.M. 1937. App. "C"). Each entry will be initialled by the officer detailed to keep the War Diary, which will be signed at the end of each month by the commander. (F.S.R. Vol. II, Sec. 35, para. 3 iii).

6. The following should be recorded daily as events occur:

- (i) Important orders, instructions, reports, messages or despatches received and issued, and decisions taken. *Original documents* should be attached as appendices to the Original copy of the War Diary.
- (ii) Daily map location, employment, movements and dispositions of unit headquarters and of batteries, companies, etc. March tables should be attached as appendices.
- (iii) Important movements of officers and matters relating to the duties of each branch of the staff. A complete set of the *routine orders and instructions, Part I Orders*, issued by the unit during the month should be attached as an appendix to the original copy.
- (iv) Detailed account of operations—to include:—
  - Exact hour, location and circumstances of important occurrences. Movements and names of neighbouring units. Commanders of batteries, companies, etc., names of Officers and number of O.R. (i) engaged and (ii) battle casualties. Dispositions, activities and identity of enemy forces. Prisoners and trophies captured. Ammunition expended. Factors affecting operations, topographical and climatic. *Maps and sketches* showing dispositions of batteries, companies etc., at important phases. The record of *communications, both written and verbal*, received or despatched during active operations as an appendix. A complete set of the *operation orders and instructions* issued during the month. Notes on conferences and *reports* rendered to higher formations, or received from lower formations, as appendices to the original copy.

- (v) Nature and description of trenches, field works or accommodation occupied or constructed. Meteorological notes.
- (vi) Changes in establishment or strength. Names and ranks of officers and number of O.R. Attachment of units and individuals. Reinforcements. *Copy of Part II Orders and Weekly Field Returns of Officers and O.R.* should be attached as appendices to the original copy. Changes in organization, stores, transport, etc.

7. It is essential that all copies of both text and appendices are legible. Appendices will be numbered and referenced to the text in the last column of the form. Current issues of any regimental publication should be attached.

8. It will be found convenient at the end of each month, when the War Diary is being completed and the correspondence in unit files for the month is being reviewed and distributed (F.S.R. Vol. I, sec. 171, para. 3) if the material considered to be of historical value in the light of the above is attached as appendices to the original copy of the War Diary.

9. A good war diary makes possible the accurate and detailed reconstruction of circumstances, conditions and action.

NOTE: If monthly diary is more than one inch thick, use a second folder. If appendices are bulky, tie folder up with tape or string to make a firm package.

## UNIT OFFICE FILING SYSTEM AND RECORDS

"Every office will arrange for the filing and custody of its own correspondence." (F.S.R. Vol. I. Sec. 171.3.)

### 1. *Titles and Numbering of Files.*

A simple filing system adaptable for use in any military office at home or in the field is illustrated by the "List of File Titles" overleaf.

All documents handled by a unit fall into one or other of the nine categories enumerated, 1 to 9. The titles of the nine main divisions are based on British army operations, organization, administration and the regulations governing. Each title may be broken down into ten component parts or sub-titles, by adding a dash and subsidiary numbers 0 to 9. In turn each of these may be further broken down by adding a second dash and a third digit, and if necessary a third dash and a fourth digit. Thus 4-7-3 might be "Cooking Course at Kingston." According to circumstances, a fighting unit would expand the 1-3 prefix to accommodate all arms and services with which it may be concerned

### 2. *Date reference.*

In giving communications a reference number, it is convenient to use the date system of four figures indicating day and month, e.g. 0102 for 1st February; 3010 for 30th October.

### 3. *Combined Numeration.*

If the systems outlined in paras 1 and 2 are combined, by placing the four date figures under the subject file numbers, a simple and informative method of reference results, thus

$$\begin{array}{r} 2-6-1 \\ \hline 0804 \end{array}$$

might be immediately identified as a communication dealing with replacement of gas masks, dated 8th April.

NOTE.—This method is not applicable to signal messages, A.F.C. 2128, which bear serial numbers 1 to 9999. The use of dashes eliminates confusion between serial numbers and file numbers.

### 4. *Documents for Preservation.*

The monthly review of correspondence (F.S.R. Vol. I, sec. 171.3) is facilitated and future confusion avoided by jacketing the material in "Category ii" (i.e., "no longer required", etc.) to conform with the system.

### 5. *Correspondence in the Field.*

The functioning of the office of a formation or unit during active operations may be simplified by keeping a log or register of all orders and messages, written or verbal, received or sent during the action. This may conveniently be done by extending the use of the "Field Register of Communications Received or Despatched", (Army Form 2040, F.S.R. Vol. I. sec. 171) to include verbal as well as written orders and messages in chronological order as received or sent.

Time of sending and of receipt are of importance second only to time of event, and should be entered both on the office copy of every field message or other document, and in the log or register. A carbon copy for contemporary reference of the commander or others concerned is desirable.

A brief précis of written orders, reports and messages, with the sender's number, is sufficient, for they will be kept on file. But particular care is necessary in making entries of times of moves and of verbal orders, reports or conversations, by telephone or otherwise, which in the stress of action, may not otherwise be recorded on paper. In battle, operations messages dealt with by one officer may number over twenty-five per hour for several hours on end.

The record should be kept convenient to the telephone. Entries may be made by a clerk, or by the officer on duty at the telephone.

Such a record is invaluable to the commander in making appreciations of the situation during the action, and in compiling his report on the action afterwards. It is contemporary evidence of the highest quality, and therefore is of the highest historical value, and should be attached as an appendix to the original copy of the War Diary, together with the original documents sent and received.

Area S Angelo S 045710 Sheet 109 II	1 Sept	44	<p>Weather:- Cloudy and warm</p> <p>A Brigade "O" Group was held in the morning and it was learned that the PLDG had passed through the Irish Regt on the high ground overlooking Tomba di Pesaro. The intention is for 89/109 Bn to cross the Foglia River near Montecchio and also to recce forward to PLDG position with the view of taking over from them. Major W.H.Buchanan and Capt G.C.Cooper now acting as Tac Adj. went forward to the new area. Capt G.C. Cooper then went forward to contact the Irish Regt and PLDG who had moved across the river and into Montecchio. Rv after dark and the C.O. proceeded the Bn. The Westminster Regt were on our left. "A" Coy suffered the heaviest casualties having 9 men killed including one man from the Int. Sect. and 12 wounded including Lt.W.S.L.Oakey. Lt.E. The two leading Coys reported "Tom" but enemy infiltration between them and Tac HQ caused a hold-up. 3 enemy tanks were sighted and taken on. At this time Major J.W.Hughes, O.C. "B" Coy was killed. 



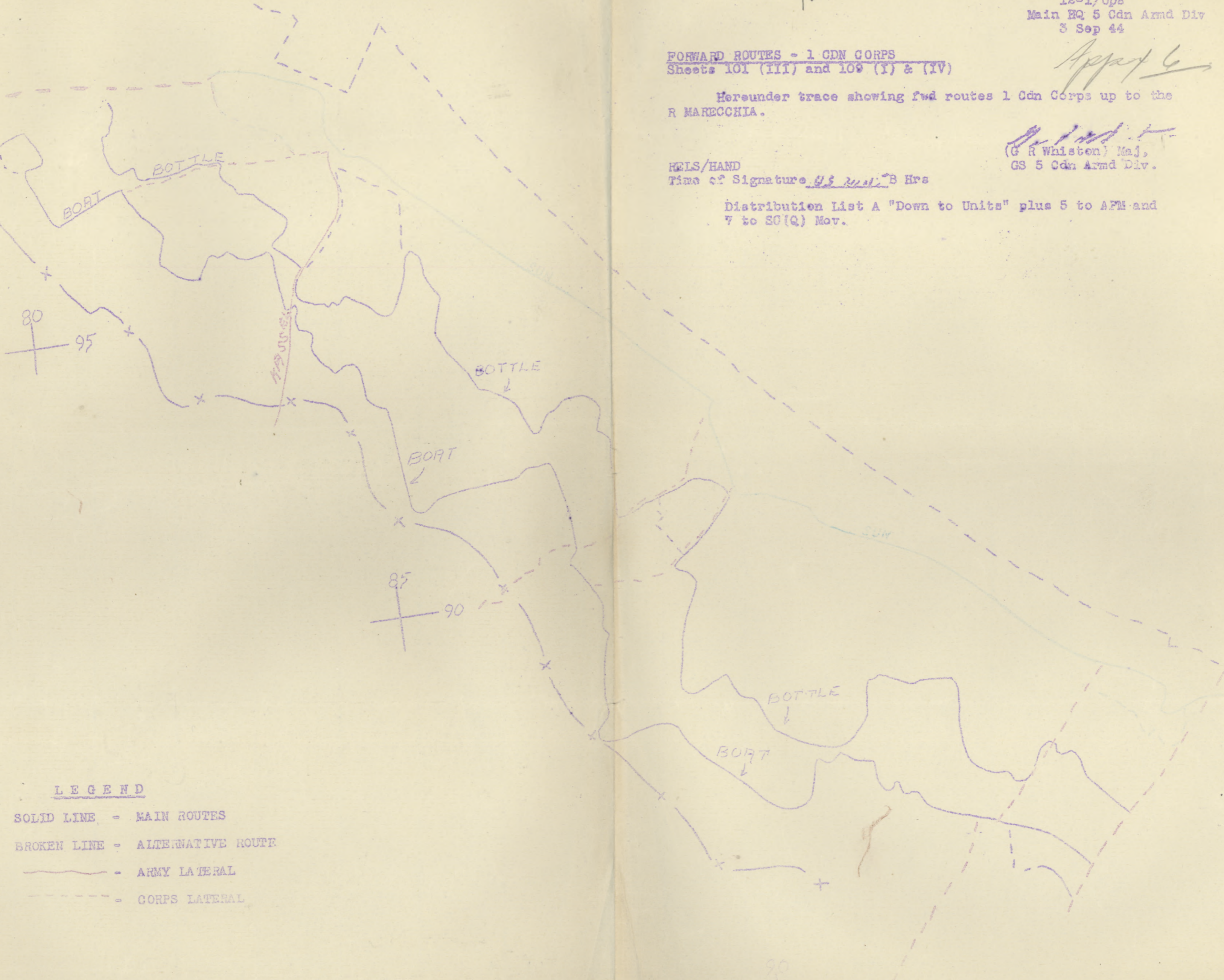
FORWARD ROUTES - 1 CDN CORPS

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1. CASUALTIES - ADVANCE BOOKS AND PAY BOOKS:

1. It is emphasized that all personnel who are evacuated should be in possession of Advance Books in the case of officers and Pay Books in the case of ORs.

2. Where an OR has been evacuated and his Pay Book is subsequently discovered, the Pay Book will be sent immediately to O 1/c Cdn Sec GHQ 2 Ech AAI. Officers Advance Books, if found, will be forwarded with kit.

2. LOOTING:

1. Looting is defined as follows:-

(a) Theft of any article from premises which have been:

(i) Damaged by war operations

(ii) Vacated by reason of attack by the enemy

or

(iii) Vacated in consequence of authorised direction.

(b) Theft of any article which has been left exposed or unprotected as a result of war operations.

2. Several instances of alleged looting have recently been reported. Civilian premises vacated by reason of ops have been entered and furniture and other articles, which could not be regarded in any way as materials of war, unlawfully removed by mil personnel.

3. It will be clearly impressed on all ranks that looting is a most serious offence and that in the UK under the Defence Regulations it is punishable by death or penal servitude for life. In future severe disciplinary action will be taken against all offenders. The charge will be laid under AA Sec 41 (Theft) and will be submitted to fnn legal offrs for approval prior to trial.

(1 CRO 395/44)

3. 1 CDN OFFRS SHOP (MOB) RCOC:

1. Offrs making purchases on other than a cash basis at 1 Cdn Offrs Shop (Mob) RCOC are required to sign a British Form AFW 3225 authorizing the sum covering total value of articles purchased to be deducted from their accounts by the Banks in which their personal accounts are held.

2. It is drawn to attention that in accordance with Cdn accounting procedure, the individual amounts concerned will NOT be debited to personal Bank accounts but to individual pay accounts maintained in Chief Treasury Office, Overseas, without further advice to offr concerned. This will result in the monthly deposits to banks being reduced by the sums involved in the month the vouchers are received by Chief Treasury Office.

(1 CRO 392/44)



4. CLAIMS - LOSS OF REGISTERED MAIL WITHIN UNITS AND FORMATIONS:

1. Where loss of or from a registered postal packet addressed to a member of the Cdn Army Overseas occurs after receipt thereof from any postal service by a unit or formation and before delivery to the addressee, compensation not exceeding \$25.00 in respect of loss of or from any one such registered postal packet shall be payable to the addressee, or to the sender upon the addressee waiving his claim.
2. The Canadian Claims Commission (Overseas) is empowered to cause such investigation as it deems necessary to be carried out in respect of the said loss and if in the opinion of the Commission the loss has occurred as aforesaid the Commission shall so certify to the Chief Treasury Officer (Overseas) stating the compensation (not exceeding \$25.00 in respect of the loss of or from any one packet) which is payable to the addressee or to the sender upon the addressee waiving his claim. The Chief Treasury Officer (Overseas) will, upon such certification, make payment accordingly.
3. Procedure for the investigation of claims will be as follows:
  - (a) Claimant will make his claim in writing to his CO who will ensure that it is supplemented by such additional written statements as may be necessary so that the claim and statement show:-
    - (i) Particulars of the date and place of mailing of the registered packet, its registered number and the name and address of the sender.
    - (ii) Particulars of the contents of the packet when mailed and proof of the value of the article or articles in respect of which the claim is made.
    - (iii) Proof of delivery of the packet to a unit or fm. .
    - (iv) Proof of the loss of the packet or its contents and of the circumstances in which the loss occurred.
    - (v) The names and particulars of all persons in whose care custody or control the packet was after its receipt by the unit or fm., and particularly at the time of the loss.
    - (vi) A statement of the amount claimed and whether payment is to be made to the addressee or to the sender.
  - (b) The CO will forward the claim, with his comments and minute of disciplinary action taken, if any, to CMHQ, attention Claims Section.
  - (c) Claims Section, CMHQ, will review the claim and make further investigation as appears necessary and submit the claim, with its recommendation, to the Commission.
4. In respect of any claim so paid the Commission has jurisdiction to order reimbursement from the postal orderly or clerk or other person serving the Crown in consequence of whose act, conduct or neglect such claim arose directly or indirectly.  
(CAORO 4956/44)

5. SECURITY - RELATIONS WITH CIVILIANS:

1. The following regulations will be strictly enforced:-
  - (a) NO civil or ex-military or PW labour will be employed in camps by HQs or units except as authorized in 1 CRO 257.
  - (b) NO casual civilians will be carried in mil vehs, except for disposal after detention, unless authorized by a provost offr. Any civilians so found will be held for disposal by FS.
  - (c) NO civilians will be allowed in unit lines other than those actually living or working therein. These will be issued with a permit which must be allied with the holder's identity card. Permits will NOT be made out to bearer and will expire within one week. Permits will NOT be signed with Orderly Room stamp but over the name of the OC of the unit without mention of unit title.
  - (d) Any inquisitive civilians will be held for disposal by FS.



6. CONDUCT OF BRITISH PRISONERS OF WAR IN GERMAN HANDS:

1. During recent operations interrogation reports on British PW have been captured from the Germans.
2. They give the names of PW and reveal that much infm has been given by them under interrogation which was of great value to the enemy. The infm included details of their Unit organization, its previous moves often with ports of embarkation and shipping used, reliefs planned and locns of other units.
3. Such indiscretions lead directly to loss of Allied soldiers' lives and endangers the success of Allied ops.
4. Immediate steps will be taken to ensure that the above infm is brought to the notice of tps and that all ranks are reminded that the only infm which a PW will give to the enemy is his

RANK, NAME and NUMBER.

5. The attention of all ranks will again be drawn to the following points:

(a) Papers and Documents

All personal papers and documents will be removed from the person before going into action. Any papers or documents (except the AB 64, MFM 182, MBM 1 or offrs identity card) which must remain on the person will be destroyed at the first opportunity after capture. Steps will be taken to ensure that the only infm contained in AB 64, MFM 182, MBM 1 and offrs identity card is owner's RANK, NAME and NUMBER.

(b) Misleading Information

No attempts will be made to mislead the enemy by giving false infm at interrogations. Such attempts will inevitably be detected.

(c) Red Cross Questionnaire

No Red Cross Questionnaire or any questionnaire form will be filled in. It is not legitimate to force PW to answer such questionnaire and in no way serves its ostensible purpose of assisting prisoners' welfare.

(d) Stool Pigeons

The German organization is adept at plating convincing stool pigeons. Prisoners will not converse among themselves on recent actions, units or on any military matters.

(e) Microphones

The Germans are experts at organizing listening-in systems with microphones planted in the most unlikely places. PW will not converse on military matters, even with the most trusted friends.

6. THERE ARE THREE ITEMS OF INFORMATION, AND THREE ITEMS ONLY, WHICH THE ENEMY SHOULD OBTAIN FROM PW WHATEVER THE CIRCUMSTANCES. THEY ARE:

RANK, NAME and NUMBER.

8. "TRIWOULD" SCHEME:  
8. "TRIWOULD" SCHEME:

1. A scheme has been approved by which Canadian Army personnel qualified as hereinafter stated may be returned to Canada or the UK for a tour of duty of approximately six months.
2. Personnel who may be considered as eligible under the terms of this scheme are:
  - (a) Those who have been wounded, otherwise than trivially, three times since 3 Sep 40.
  - (b) Those who have been wounded, otherwise trivially, twice since 3 Sep 40 and who have had more than three years continuous service with the Cdn Army Overseas.
3. For the purpose of this order the term "wounded" shall include:
  - (a) Injuries resulting from enemy action or from the action of our own forces against the enemy and caused by the use of a weapon or other instrument of destruction, including shell, bullet or other projectile, bomb, bayonet, mine or employment of chemical warfare.
  - (b) Injuries caused by splinters or fragments or masonry set in motion by any of the causes mentioned in sub-para (a), or the collapse of buildings or damage to land routes arising from the same cause.
4. Self-inflicted wounds or wounds resulting from accidents due to improper conduct of the wounded soldier will not be accepted as qualifying.
5. Personnel returned to Canada under the scheme will be posted to an appropriate unit in Canada for six months tour of duty. Personnel may, if they so elect, be posted to an appropriate unit in the UK for six months tour of duty. Return to Canada or the UK will not be considered as automatic but will be subject to the exigencies of the service.
6. Individuals claiming eligibility under the terms previously outlined and who are desirous of returning to Canada or the UK will make application to their Commanding Officers. Officers Commanding units will forward applications to OsIC Cdn Secs GHQ 2 Ech or OIC Records CMBQ, as appropriate, for verification.
7. Names of individuals becoming eligible subsequent to the date of this order will be advised to Officers Commanding units, including Officers Commanding medical units, by OsIC Cdn Secs GHQ 2 Ech or OIC Records, CMBQ.
8. Applications will be referred to one of the following authorities for decision as to eligibility:

- OIC Cdn Sec GHQ 2 Ech AAI
- OIC Cdn Sec GHQ 2 Ech 21 A Gp
- OIC Records, CMBQ

Consequent on authority being granted immediate action will be taken by the above to ensure return of individuals concerned as soon as conditions will permit.

1. CIVILIAN MOVEMENT, ITALIAN AUXILIARY POLICE:

1. In order to prevent unauthorized civil movement, to canalize civilian refugees and to single out possible enemy agents among them, Field Security organize Control Posts as far forward as is feasible. Supplementary posts are set up throughout the Corps area.
2. As sufficient Carabinieri and Italian military are not available, these posts are frequently manned by auxiliary police enlisted by Pd Security locally. These men carry arms and are provided with a certificate signed by Pd Security identifying them as civil auxiliary police.
3. These men also carry out coast watching duties, and may be used to guard VPs.
4. There have been several occasions recently of tps interfering with these men, disarming them and forcing them to desert their posts. The immediate result has been an influx of civilian traffic on main supply routes and opportunities for agents to slip through.
5. It will be brought to the attention of all ranks that these auxiliary police are carrying out an essential duty for the protection of tps and should be given assistance whenever possible.
