WAR DIARIES, C.A.S.F.

Instructions for Compilation and Despatch

1. A War Diary is **SECRET**.
2. The War Diary takes the place of the Historical Record when on active service. (K.R. Can. Para. 1530). Its objects are: to supply authentic material for the history of the unit, and of the force; to furnish a historical record of operations; and to provide data upon which to base improvements in training, equipment, organization and administration.
3. Unless otherwise ordered, the original and duplicate copies are sent on the first day of the succeeding month, through the usual channels, to the A.G., 2nd Echelon, wherever that office may be. The triplicate copy may be held by the unit for three months and then forwarded, also through the usual channels, to A.G., 2nd Echelon.
4. Post-war disposal will be as under:
 - Original—retained at Ottawa for historical purposes.
 - Duplicate—to British Record Office for historical purposes.
 - Triplicate—to unit for custody with unit records.
5. The War Diary will be entered up daily on M.F.M. 11 and rendered monthly in triplicate (Mobn. Instr. for C.M. 1937. App. "C"). Each entry will be initialled by the officer detailed to keep the War Diary, which will be signed at the end of each month by the commander. (F.S.R. Vol. II, Sec. 35, para. 3 iii).

6. The following should be recorded daily as events occur:
 - (i) Important orders, instructions, reports, messages or despatches received and issued, and decisions taken. *Original documents* should be attached as appendices to the Original copy of the War Diary.
 - (ii) Daily map location, employment, movements and dispositions of unit headquarters and of batteries, companies, etc. March tables should be attached as appendices.
 - (iii) Important movements of officers and matters relating to the duties of each branch of the staff. A complete set of the *routine orders and instructions, Part I Orders*, issued by the unit during the month should be attached as an appendix to the original copy.
 - (iv) Detailed account of operations—to include:—
 - Exact hour, location and circumstances of important occurrences. Movements and names of neighbouring units. Commanders of batteries, companies, etc., names of Officers and number of O.R. (i) engaged and (ii) battle casualties. Dispositions, activities and identity of enemy forces. Prisoners and trophies captured. Ammunition expended. Factors affecting operations, topographical and climatic. *Maps and sketches* showing dispositions of batteries, companies etc., at important phases. The record of *communications, both written and verbal*, received or despatched during active operations as an appendix. A complete set of the *operation orders and instructions* issued during the month. Notes on conferences and *reports* rendered to higher formations, or received from lower formations, as appendices to the original copy.

- (v) Nature and description of trenches, field works or accommodation occupied or constructed. Meteorological notes.
 - (vi) Changes in establishment or strength. Names and ranks of officers and number of O.R. Attachment of units and individuals. Reinforcements. *Copy of Part II Orders and Weekly Field Returns of Officers and O.R.* should be attached as appendices to the original copy. Changes in organization, stores, transport, etc.
 7. It is essential that all copies of both text and appendices are legible. Appendices will be numbered and referenced to the text in the last column of the form. Current issues of any regimental publication should be attached.
 8. It will be found convenient at the end of each month, when the War Diary is being completed and the correspondence in unit files for the month is being reviewed and distributed (F.S.R. Vol. I, sec. 171, para. 3) if the material considered to be of historical value in the light of the above is attached as appendices to the original copy of the War Diary.
 9. A good war diary makes possible the accurate and detailed reconstruction of circumstances, conditions and action.
- NOTE: If monthly diary is more than one inch thick, use a second folder. If appendices are bulky, tie folder up with tape or string to make a firm package.

UNIT OFFICE FILING SYSTEM AND RECORDS

"Every office will arrange for the filing and custody of its own correspondence." (F.S.R. Vol. I. Sec. 171.3.)

1. *Titles and Numbering of Files.*

A simple filing system adaptable for use in any military office at home or in the field is illustrated by the "List of File Titles" overleaf.

All documents handled by a unit fall into one or other of the nine categories enumerated, 1 to 9. The titles of the nine main divisions are based on British army operations, organization, administration and the regulations governing. Each title may be broken down into ten component parts or sub-titles, by adding a dash and subsidiary numbers 0 to 9. In turn each of these may be further broken down by adding a second dash and a third digit, and if necessary a third dash and a fourth digit. Thus 4-7-3 might be "Cooking Course at Kingston." According to circumstances, a fighting unit would expand the 1-3 prefix to accommodate all arms and services with which it may be concerned

2. *Date reference.*

In giving communications a reference number, it is convenient to use the date system of four figures indicating day and month, e.g. 0102 for 1st February; 3010 for 30th October.

3. *Combined Numeration.*

If the systems outlined in paras 1 and 2 are combined, by placing the four date figures under the subject file numbers, a simple and informative method of reference results, thus

$$\frac{2-6-1}{0804}$$

might be immediately identified as a communication dealing with replacement of gas masks, dated 8th April.

NOTE.—This method is not applicable to signal messages, A.F.C. 2128, which bear serial numbers 1 to 9999. The use of dashes eliminates confusion between serial numbers and file numbers.

4. *Documents for Preservation.*

The monthly review of correspondence (F.S.R. Vol. I, sec. 171.3) is facilitated and future confusion avoided by jacketing the material in "Category ii" (i.e., "no longer required", etc.) to conform with the system.

5. *Correspondence in the Field.*

The functioning of the office of a formation or unit during active operations may be simplified by keeping a log or register of all orders and messages, written or verbal, received or sent during the action. This may conveniently be done by extending the use of the "Field Register of Communications Received or Despatched", (Army Form 2040, F.S.R. Vol. I. sec. 171) to include verbal as well as written orders and messages in chronological order as received or sent.

Time of sending and of receipt are of importance second only to time of event, and should be entered both on the office copy of every field message or other document, and in the log or register. A carbon copy for contemporary reference of the commander or others concerned is desirable.

A brief précis of written orders, reports and messages, with the sender's number, is sufficient, for they will be kept on file. But particular care is necessary in making entries of times of moves and of verbal orders, reports or conversations, by telephone or otherwise, which in the stress of action, may not otherwise be recorded on paper. In battle, operations messages dealt with by one officer may number over twenty-five per hour for several hours on end.

The record should be kept convenient to the telephone. Entries may be made by a clerk, or by the officer on duty at the telephone.

Such a record is invaluable to the commander in making appreciations of the situation during the action, and in compiling his report on the action afterwards. It is contemporary evidence of the highest quality, and therefore is of the highest historical value, and should be attached as an appendix to the original copy of the War Diary, together with the original documents sent and received.

1. CENSORSHIP - RELEASE

1. Reference may be made to participation in the battle of CASSINO up to and including 18 May 44, subject to strict observance of censorship regulations governing account of battle experience, as reproduced in para 2 hereunder.

2. In connection with any mention of individual and personal participation in such operations, the following rules will be observed by all ranks, and unit censors will be held responsible for an intelligent interpretation thereof:

(a) No geographical locn other than the sector authorized will be identified e.g. in this the F GARI may be mentioned, but not the names of villages, etc., on or near the river.

(b) When there is a limiting date, troops whose participation in the operation commenced after the limiting date, may NOT mention participation.

(c) No military formation or unit (even the writer's own) will be identified except by correct return address.

(d) No mention of participation in the above operation is permitted.

(i) In green envelope mail and privelege air letters.

(ii) In letters addressed to countries other than the United Kingdom, Eiro, British Empire, Continental United States of America.

(iii) In telegrams.

3. Particular attention will be paid to para 2 (d) above.

4. To be repeated in all fm and unit orders.
(Int 21/Censor/1)

HYGIENE AND SANITATION

1. It is reported that units in many cases on changing location are not leaving camp sites clean and in proper condition for occupation by other units.

2. As the fly season is now beginning, it is essential that every step be taken to leave areas clean of refuse which attracts flies and thus helps to spread dysent cry and other infections. Rubbish, garbage and tin cans must be collected and burned and/or buried. Latrines must be filled in and marked as foul ground.

3. In future the following procedure will be adopted by all units whenever operationally possible.

(a) A rear party will be left behind to clean up the area.

(b) An adv party will be sent fwd to prepare latrines, soakage pits etc., before arrival of the main body, so that no fouling of the ground will occur.

1. GUARDING OF WAR DEPARTMENT VEHICLES
1- A

1. A large number of WD vehicles have recently been stolen both in North Africa and Italy. In many cases, the vehicles were immobilised, but this was not sufficient to prevent the determined thieves from stealing them. Many thefts of property from unattended vehicles have also been reported.
2. In future there are, WD vehicles (including motorcycles) will never be left unattended except:-
 - (a) When essential on operation grounds.
 - (b) On account of other urgent necessity.
 - (c) In circumstances in which immobilisation has been authorized. (See para 8 below.
3. All units having MT on charge will arrange for their vehicles parks to be guarded by day and night. Small units who have difficulty in finding their own guard may arrange, if possible, to park their vehicles with those of a unit where a guard is mounted.
4. When on duty, it is the driver's responsibility to ensure that arrangements are made for his vehicle to be safe guarded at all times. He must ensure that any car park or DR's motorcycle park in which he leaves his vehicle is officially authorized and guarded.
5. The Military Police will not be used to guard vehicles of units other than their own. The duty at car parks, etc., is to control traffic and parking of vehicles, and the fact that they are present does not absolve any driver from his responsibility for safeguarding his own vehicle.
6. The practice of immobilising vehicles leads to mechanical inefficiency and damage. This method of safe guarding vehicles will no longer be used, except by officers permitted to do so under para 8 below, or when ordered by Divisional or higher HQ in an operational area.
7. Disciplinary action will be taken against drivers who leave their vehicles unattended, except as in para (2), (a), (b) and (c) above; and where as a result the vehicle, or any WD property contained therein; is lost; the offender will be normally be tried by Court Martial. Disciplinary action will also be considered against officers who fail to ensure that their drivers observe the provisions of this order.
8. (a) Certain officers have been supplied with WD or requisitioned vehicles for which no military drivers have been provided. Where compliance with the terms of this GRO would hinder such officer in the proper performance of their duties, they will apply to their Bde or equivalent HQ for a written permit to leave their vehicles unattended when no other arrangement can be made

(b) This permit will be in the following form:

(Rank and name) of (unit or department) is authorized to leave WD/Requisitioned vehicle number..... unattended while he is carrying out military duties, provided that:

- (i) There is no military driver or other person in whose care the vehicle could be left.
- (ii) There is no military unit within reasonable distance under whose guard the vehicle could be placed.
- (iii) The vehicle is both locked (if possible) or immobilised.

The permit will be signed by or in behalf of the Bde, etc., Comd, and will be stamped with the HQ stamp.

(c) Such a permit will not be issued unless the authorizing officer is satisfied that the vehicle can be immobilised.

(d) It will be carried out by the driver and produced on request of a military policeman or other proper authority.

(e) Possession of such a permit does not absolve an officer from making the best possible arrangements to have his car guarded at all times, nor does it affect his responsibility for the safety of any WD vehicle, property or documents, etc, which may be in the vehicle.

(f) No permits will be issued in respect of motor-cycles, which will never be left unattended except as in para 2 above.

9. Particulars of WD vehicles lost by theft will be immediately reported by units (a) to their formation APM/DAPM, and (b) direct to AFHQ (Q) (AE).

Reports of the return of the vehicles will also be made.

10. Applicable to all troops, BNAF and CMF (incl Women's services).

TRAINING PROGRAM-PERIOD 15 - 24 JUNE 44

1. OBJECT

To study and train on Pl and Coy level role of Sp Gp in break through and pursuit battle.

2. OBSERVATIONS

- (a) While the role of Sp Gp is most flexible this trg period should cover points for further training that presented themselves in ops just completed as well as points concerned with ops of a mobile nature.
- (b) Trg time is restricted to five hours daily. Purpose to get most out of men in short period and during cooler hours of the day.

1 The following message has been received from Lt-Gen Sir Oliver Leese, Bt KCB CBE DSO, Comd Eighth Army, and is passed for the infm of all tps under comd:

"GOC 5 Cdn Armd Div

I feel I would like to write you this short letter, conveying my thanks and congratulations to you and your Division on the successful outcome of your first fight as a Division.

To you was given the arduous task to exploit the break of the 1st Canadian Division through the ADOLF HITLER LINE and continue the pursuit. Owing to physical difficulties, it was particularly difficult for you to pass your Division quickly through the bottle-neck of the breach in the HITLER LINE. That you accomplished this task is to the credit of you all.

You then advanced with great dash to the MELFA LINE, where brilliant actions were fought; in particular by the Governor General's Horse Guards, Strathcona's Horse, and the Westminster Regt. After that you had considerable fighting with your infantry brigade, culminating in the passage by swimming and boating, under fire, by the Irish Regiment of Canada and the Perth Regiment, at Ceprano.

I congratulate you particularly on the work of your infantry, tanks, and sappers. I am very proud to have the 5th Canadian Armoured Division in the Eighth Army; and I have learned in this battle how greatly I can rely on you in the future.

I would be glad if you would convey my grateful thanks and best wishes for the future to all ranks in your Division.
