Instructions for Compilation and Despatch

1. A War Diary is **SECRET**.

2. The War Diary takes the place of the Historical Record when on active service. (K.R. Can. Para. 1530). Its objects are: to supply authentic material for the history of the unit, and of the force; to furnish a historical record of operations; and to provide data upon which to base improvements in training, equipment, organization and administration.

3. Unless otherwise ordered, the original and duplicate copies are sent on the first day of the succeeding month, through the usual channels, to the A.G., 2nd Echelon, wherever that office may be. The triplicate copy may be held by the unit for three months and then forwarded, also through the usual channels, to A.G., 2nd Echelon.

4. Post-war disposal will be as under:

Original—retained at Ottawa for historical purposes.

Duplicate—to British Record Office for historical purposes.

Triplicate—to unit for custody with unit records.

5. The War Diary will be entered up daily on M.F.M. 11 and rendered monthly in triplicate (Mobn. Instr. for C.M. 1937. App. "C"). Each entry will be initialled by the officer detailed to keep the War Diary, which will be signed at the end of each month by the commander. (F.S.R. Vol. II, Sec. 35, para. 3 iii).

6. The following should be recorded daily as events occur:

(i) Important orders, instructions, reports, messages or despatches received and issued, and decisions taken. *Original documents* should be attached as appendices to the Original copy of the War Diary.

(ii) Daily map location, employment, movements and dispositions of unit headquarters and of batteries, companies, etc. March tables should be attached as appendices.

(iii) Important movements of officers and matters relating to the duties of each branch of the staff. A complete set of the *routine orders and instructions, Part I Orders*, issued by the unit during the month should be attached as an appendix to the original copy.

(iv) Detailed account of operations—to include:—Exact hour, location and circumstances of important occurrences. Movements and names of neighbouring units. Commanders of batteries, companies, etc., names of Officers and number of O.R. (i) engaged and (ii) battle casualties. Dispositions, activities and identity of enemy forces. Prisoners and trophies captured. Ammunition expended. Factors affecting operations, topographical and climatic. *Maps and sketches* showing dispositions of batteries, companies etc., at important phases. The record of *communications, both written and verbal*, received or despatched during active operations as an appendix. A complete set of the *operation orders and instructions* issued during the month. Notes on conferences and *reports* rendered to higher formations, or received from lower formations, as appendices to the original copy.

(v) Nature and description of trenches, field works or accommodation occupied or constructed. Meteorological notes.

(vi) Changes in establishment or strength. Names and ranks of officers and number of O.R. Attachment of units and individuals. Reinforcements. *Copy of Part II Orders and Weekly Field Returns of Officers and O.R.* should be attached as appendices to the original copy. Changes in organization, stores, transport, etc.

7. It is essential that all copies of both text and appendices are legible. Appendices will be numbered and referenced to the text in the last column of the form. Current issues of any regimental publication should be attached.

8. It will be found convenient at the end of each month, when the War Diary is being completed and the correspondence in unit files for the month is being reviewed and distributed (F.S.R. Vol. I, sec. 171, para. 3) if the material considered to be of historical value in the light of the above is attached as appendices to the original copy of the War Diary.

9. A good war diary makes possible the accurate and detailed reconstruction of circumstances, conditions and action.

NOTE: If monthly diary is more than one inch thick, use a second folder. If appendices are bulky, tie folder up with tape or string to make a firm package.

UNIT OFFICE FILING SYSTEM AND RECORDS

"Every office will arrange for the filing and custody of its own correspondence." (F.S.R. Vol. I. Sec. 171.3.)

1. *Titles and Numbering of Files.*

A simple filing system adaptable for use in any military office at home or in the field is illustrated by the "List of File Titles" overleaf.

All documents handled by a unit fall into one or other of the nine categories enumerated, 1 to 9. The titles of the nine main divisions are based on British army operations, organization, administration and the regulations governing. Each title may be broken down into ten component parts or sub-titles, by adding a dash and subsidiary numbers 0 to 9. In turn each of these may be further broken down by adding a second dash and a third digit, and if necessary a third dash and a fourth digit. Thus 4-7-3 might be "Cooking Course at Kingston." According to circumstances, a fighting unit would expand the 1-3 prefix to accommodate all arms and services with which it may be concerned

2. *Date reference.*

In giving communications a reference number, it is convenient to use the date system of four figures indicating day and month, e.g. 0102 for 1st February; 3010 for 30th October.

3. *Combined Numeration.*

If the systems outlined in paras 1 and 2 are combined, by placing the four date figures under the subject file numbers, a simple and informative method of reference results, thus

might be immediately identified as a communication dealing with replacement of gas masks, dated 8th April.

NOTE.—This method is not applicable to signal messages, A.F.C. 2128, which bear serial numbers 1 to 9999. The use of dashes eliminates confusion between serial numbers and file numbers.

4. *Documents for Preservation.*

The monthly review of correspondence (F.S.R. Vol. I, sec. 171.3) is facilitated and future confusion avoided by jacketing the material in "Category ii" (i.e., "no longer required", etc.) to conform with the system.

5. *Correspondence in the Field.*

The functioning of the office of a formation or unit during active operations may be simplified by keeping a log or register of all orders and messages, written or verbal, received or sent during the action. This may conveniently be done by extending the use of the "Field Register of Communications Received or Despatched", (Army Form 2040, F.S.R. Vol. I. sec. 171) to include verbal as well as written orders and messages in chronological order as received or sent.

Time of sending and of receipt are of importance second only to time of event, and should be entered both on the office copy of every field message or other document, and in the log or register. A carbon copy for contemporary reference of the commander or others concerned is desirable.

A brief précis of written orders, reports and messages, with the sender's number, is sufficient, for they will be kept on file. But particular care is necessary in making entries of times of moves and of verbal orders, reports or conversations, by telephone or otherwise, which in the stress of action, may not otherwise be recorded on paper. In battle, operations messages dealt with by one officer may number over twenty-five per hour for several hours on end.

The record should be kept convenient to the telephone. Entries may be made by a clerk, or by the officer on duty at the telephone.

Such a record is invaluable to the commander in making appreciations of the situation during the action, and in compiling his report on the action afterwards. It is contemporary evidence of the highest quality, and therefore is of the highest historical value, and should be attached as an appendix to the original copy of the War Diary, together with the original documents sent and received.



PART ONE

1 ENEMY SITUATION

The fight for FLORENCE is focussing the main attention of both sides, and a rather bitter struggle is ensuing. The Boche has approximately three divisions hanging onto the high ground this side of the city, and is resisting our every advance to the extent of mounting sharp counter-attacks with TIGER sp and lorried inf.

4 Para Div is astride Route 2 with 12 Regt left and II Bn of both 11 and 10 Regts on the right. From the 73 Easting to GINESTRA Q 6463, 29 Pz Div holds with 71 and 15 Regts EAST and WEST with 103 Recce Unit liaising with 29 PCR on the right. 356 Inf Div holds to the East of 4 Para across to the 88 Easting with 715 Inf Div the remaining div to the Army boundary, the far side of Route 69. The armoured sp for the defence of FLORENCE comes from 508 k Bn. According to a PW, only 3 Sqn remains, the TIGERS from 1 and 2 having been cannibalized to make up an effective strength of 17 runners with 10 in wksp.

Elsewhere across the front this Teutonic pertinacity is not in evidence. 334 Inf Div and 15 PG Div seem both content to give ground on the PRATO MAGNO, for some inexplicable reason not deeming it worthy of retention. Equally, to the EAST 305 Inf, 44 Hoch und Deutschmeister and 114 Jaeger Divs, are putting up only a slight show of resistance. 5 Mtn and 71 Inf Divs are doing much the same, whilst 278 Inf Div has retired across the F. BELSA.

In the WEST XIV Pz Corps is resenting FIFTH Army's attempts to probe across the R ARNO and little progress has been made there recently, a period of regrouping being in progress.

Thus it appears that except for the battle for FLORENCE the enemy is content to hold the ARNO in the WEST and to withdraw to the mountain fastnesses of the GOTHIC Line in the centre and the EAST. In this gradual withdrawal it is possible that 15 PG Div may be pulled out as a future mobile reserve with some infantry fm taking its place.

Of old friends, 1 Para Regt has been identified in the area of S 0480, whilst MOSCOW has announced that a crack German Div from ITALY (HG Para Pz) has been rushed to the defence of WARSAW. 90 PG Div is not in the line at the moment, and is thought to be refurbishing behind FLORENCE.

What the Boche will do after the fall of FLORENCE it is difficult to say. He can either withdraw to the GOTHIC Line or else hold the hills between PRATO and B. COMANO and the thin ridge fwd of PISTOIA, and the decision will presumably rest on how he fares further to the EAST. At any rate, it should not be long before we are gazing at that much advertised commodity, DIE GOTHEN STELLUNG.

2. ENEMY METHODS

(a) The German in Withdrawal

The choice of successive defence lines is determined by a careful study of ground and by the intention to force the enemy to move his army. On each one of these new positions the German obeys a certain number of simple principles which can be summed up as follows:

He seeks:

to observe;

to surprise - by setting up outposts which serve as "feelers" and force the enemy to delay prematurely. Choice of unexpected site for the MLR (especially on reverse slopes). Very strict discipline which forbids any movement within sight of the enemy. Surprise effect of short, violent army reaction and of weapons. Yielding of limited sectors where the assailant will commit himself and be brought under fire.

to intimidate - to give an impression of fire power by concentrating all his fire on certain objectives.

to fool - the enemy must not be allowed to deduce from the defender's behaviour the day on which he intends to withdraw; the German therefore makes a show of activity the day before a withdrawal by violent counter-attacks and by showing his armour.

to delay - numerous demolitions, mines, booby traps. Harassing fire on the approaches to these demolitions.

(b) Morale

The two divs (356 and 4 Para Div) now in the centre of our front showed themselves disciplined (during disengagement and during the taking up of new positions) and aggressive (aggressive defence and counter-attack). It seems however that the Para div is more fanatical than the inf div. The reason seems to be (according to PW) that a large number of the parachutists are volunteers. There is in fact a very marked difference between the parachutist and the infantryman:

difference in pay - parachutists draw 3 times as much as infantrymen;

difference in uniform - parachutists have a lighter, better fitting uniform; they are allowed greater freedom (open shirts etc);

difference in food - parachutists are fed as Luftwaffe personnel and, for this reason, enjoy special rations.

To these material reasons there is added the prestige of a young arm which already claims the victories of CRETE and of LEROS (in which many parachutists of 4 Para participated). These advantages were not enough to attract many recruits; it was necessary to send conscripts to the para divs. However, it is still the officer personnel and the volunteers who give "tone" to these units.

The infantry of 356 Inf Div are less arrogant and less confident in a German victory than those of 4 Para Div. They are, however, excellent soldiers who have learnt, through long experience in battle, the technique of war.

The sight of a disciplined, methodical withdrawal, executed according to a fixed plan, has proved to both sides that their faith in the German leaders was justified and has been an indication that the Allies were unable to encircle or to annihilate their units. To this conviction is added the expectancy of a clear victory to be obtained through the secret weapon. They think that the Russian danger is only temporary; as soon as victory is achieved over Britain (thanks

to the secret weapon), all the German divs will be able to turn against the Russian invader and crush him.

famous chapter to the history of your Division 'Hoch-und Deutsch-
meister'. The battle of 27 Jun on both sides of the TIBER and the
assault of Monte MURLO and Monte ACUTO on 3 Jul are shining examples
of your heroism.'

Superiority in material is not decisive - what is decisive
is the spirit and the belief in the righteousness of a cause.

Long live the Fatherland!
Long live the Führer.

SUBJECT: - Report on actions and Experiences during the
period from 11 Apr to 30 Jun 44.

During the period covered by this report, this bty, as part of 71 Werfer Regt, was engaged in rearguard actions in the GUSTAV posns (following the course of the R. GARI Southwards) and in the SENGEL Line (along the AQUINO-POMTECORVO rd).

Type of action: - Defensive.

The Bty was placed in sp of the following fms:-

1 Apr to 11 May	-	15 PG Div	
12 May to 27 May	-	90 Inf Div. (mot)	(sic)
28 May to 15 Jun	-	Pz G Div "H.G."	(sic)
16 Jun to 30 Jun	-	1 Para Div	

During the period covered by this report the Bty had the following missions:-

1. From 1 Apr to 12 May, to support the inf in positional warfare.
2. From 13 May to 30 Jun, during the withdrawal actions, to engage enemy attacks and conc, as well as to cover the withdrawal of the last inf elements.

These missions were carried through by the requisite siting of normal and advanced OPs and by the choice of gun posns.

The heavy attacks during the time of the positional warfare, as well as during the withdrawal actions, were broken up by concentrated and observed fire. On many occasions the covering salvos forced the enemy to withdraw. Enemy conc were dispersed by observed fire and tks were set on fire.

SPECIAL POINTS.

a) Difficulties. During the withdrawal actions, which necessitated almost daily changes of posns, lack of vehs caused difficulties, which were solved by the most complete use of vehs for amn transport and by an increased employment of IADs. Road congestion at times prevented the scheduled withdrawals and caused delays up to 24 hrs.

b) The gun tps, as well as advanced OPs, were leapfrogged back, a system which worked very well. With four tps in action, two tps moved back first, reported when they were ready to fire from their new area and then the other two tps moved back, so that continuous fire-readiness was maintained.

Three advanced OPs were employed at any one time. These remained forward until the inf withdrew. On the same day three other advanced OPs, destined for the next posns, took up their posns and were able to orient themselves by daylight and were in posn when the inf arrived.

c) For an example of the ever recurring signals layout, see attached sigs diagram. (The latter is not reproduced here).

d) Types of survey and positioning - normal.

e) Targets - Method of indication and engaging:

The following were engaged: enemy inf, veh and tk conc, enemy inf attacks and billets.

Targets were reported either by our own OPs or by the inf, or given by HQ of the Werfer Regt.

Normally the target was registered and engaged by conc fire. Only in exceptional cases did we shoot off the map.

f) Ammunition Consumption. Targets were engaged by salvos from tps or the bty according to their area of importance. Because of the few gun cas these salvos were usually complete. During the period covered by this report, the following amm was expended:-

3651 rounds - 21 cm HE
6919 rounds - 15 cm HE
302 rounds - 15 cm Smoke
254 rounds - 15 cm "Arktis".

g) Recognition of Success.

i) Decoration of the Regtl Comd with the Knight's Cross to the Iron Cross.

ii) During the defensive battles in the PONTECORVO area from 12 May to 27 May, tks were engaged and two definite and five probable enemy tks were destroyed.

On 24 Jun in the PESCIA area and on 26 Jun at CASA MAGGIORE respectively one enemy tk was destroyed by Werfer fire.

Confirmation (by inf) of tk destroyed on 26 Jun is available.

iii) Messages of appreciation from inf units confirm the good placing of salvos.

a) Messages from Rgt ZIEGLER to 90 Div on 18 May -
"If Werfers don't fire, we cannot hold".

b) Message from Inf Regt 575 (sic) to this Bty on 11 Jun -
"Special recognition of good Werfer fire by Major TIMPKE".

c) Message from Inf Bn at PONTECORVO on 16 May -
"Salvos well placed. All attacks beaten off with help of Werfer Regt. Bn thanks you".

d) OP of an Arty unit reported on 19 May -
"Werfer salvos fell on to an enemy bn and destroyed it.
An enemy Command Post destroyed by direct hit during 'O' Gp".

h) Special Experiences

i) Registration and conc salvos could always be fired. Fire orders could usually be passed by line.

ii) Organisation, armament and equipment of smoke tps has proved itself suitable. No suggestion for changes.

iii) "Arktis" amm was used and fired without difficulty in early morning hrs. According to the temperature of the morning hrs the range shown by the map had to be decreased by 400 - 600 metres.

Since 15 Jun the 21 cm Werfers have been engaged with built in rails (Einbauschiemen) for 15 cm amm. There is no difficulty in firing the 15 cm amm.

PARTISANS

The following account of the two main Partisan bands operating in the CORTONA area, before and at our arrival, illustrates the two main tendencies in the Italian Resistance Movement.

One was led by one Aldo SCOPINI, who, as one of his assistants was at pains to explain, was a simple, uneducated type. According to his own account, his family has long been the victim of Fascist persecution, and this may explain the lack of educational opportunity. Before the CORTONA area was taken by the Allies some information had already been received about this band. It was said to number about 100 - a figure later confirmed by SCOPINI himself. Some informants said that they were little better than robbers, robbing the Germans of their loot, not to restore it to its owners but to enjoy it themselves. Another informant, who did not lay any such specific accusations, gave the impression that he thought them a poor lot. Yet another went so far as to say that SCOPINI was merely a Fascist turncoat.

When the Allies arrived in CORTONA, they found the streets gay with red shirts. When SCOPINI was asked if this was a sign of sympathy for our Russian allies, he replied that it was in memory of Garibaldi, and a sign of their fervent Italian patriotism - nothing else. When asked if this band held any definite political views, he could give no definite answer.

SCOPINI was a startling figure, having attired himself in a white shirt and shorts, which were in striking contrast to a red shirt, and a pair of black half-length jack-boots. The remainder of his followers were more humbly clad, wearing red shirts with drab civilian trousers. He answered the accusation of looting by saying, quite plausibly, that such cattle as he had taken from the Germans had been used to feed the refugees in the hills. He also explained away the charge that he had fought for the Fascists in Spain by saying that he had volunteered for the Abyssinian war and had suddenly found himself transferred willy-nilly to Spain.

When asked about the activities of the band, the reply consisted purely of generalities and lurid accounts of German punitive expeditions. The band did, however, shelter several Allied ex-PW, both English and Russian, and just before the arrival of the Allied troops did shut up some of the local Fascists. But the interview ended with the feeling that in the case of this band the wish had certainly been father to the thought.

The blaze of red in the streets of CORTONA tended to blind one to the activities of the other local band, which was led by a Lt VALLA and whose story is the exact reverse.

This band was first effectively organised in the first week of June, and contained 37 members. They were businesslike enough to keep a "war diary", which was subsequently brought to this office. This is written in a racy and dramatic style, but the following facts emerge from it. Between 6 - 30 June, this band, which was operating in the hills to the NE of CORTONA, through which runs the road to CITTA DI CATELLO R 5361 -

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LIVING OFF THE LAND

Animal Foods.

All animals of the European continent are edible. Men should be impressed with the importance of forgetting old prejudices when they are faced with the necessity of eating anything they can get hold of. Moreover, they may discover that many animals so far neglected or despised as food are, in fact, good tasty food when prejudice is forgotten. For example, people who like raw oysters are horrified at the idea of eating raw snails, although these are just as good and just as tasty as oysters, and are much cleaner feeders because they live on foliage.

All animals may be eaten raw or cooked. Animal food is rather more digestible when eaten raw than when cooked.

The above facts should be driven home before reading the following details, because it is important to sink all prejudice and every consideration except the bedrock necessity of getting food somehow in order to keep going, and the right frame of mind must be created at the outset.

Because they have a higher food-value than most vegetable foods, small animals, even two or three snails or some frogs' legs, are worth collecting for adding to a meal of boiled leaves or roots. But the finding of animal food in quantity is uncertain, where vegetable food, especially wild plants, is virtually certain.

Rats and Mice (rats et souris). - Both are palatable meat. Rats cooked in a stew might be mistaken for chicken. Skin them, "Gut" them and boil in a mess - tin; rats for about 10 minutes, mice for five minutes. Either can be cooked with dandelion leaves for a stew. Be sure to include the livers.

Birds (oiseaux). All birds are edible. Moorhens or coots may be found in ponds; the former are palatable, the latter tough and unpalatable but nevertheless good food.

Frogs (grenouilles). The meat of all frogs is delicate and wholesome. Most of the meat is on the hind legs.

Snails (escargots). All snails are a real delicacy. They can be eaten in two ways: (a) raw, by cracking the shell and withdrawing the snail; (b) by dropping them into boiling water for five minutes and pulling out the cooked snail with a pin.

Dogs and Cats (chiens et chats). Providing much food, they are worth much trouble in capture by friendly advances. The liver is the most valuable part. Either animal stewed with edible leaves will provide an excellent meal.

Grass Snakes and Lizards (serpents et lézards). Both are palatable. To eat the snakes, cut off the heads, skin them (easily done) and boil for ten minutes.

Hedgehogs (hérissons). A hedgehog would be a lucky find (in a dry ditch). Turn it on its back, tickle the body lightly with a stick or the fingers. It will then poke out its head and neck, which can be severed by a stroke of a knife. Skin and cook as suggested for dogs and cats.

Eels (anguilles). and coarse Fish might be found in ponds or deep, sluggish streams.

Horse meat closely resembles beef.

- (a) Killed 10 German soldiers.
- (b) Took 11 PW, who were later handed over to the Allies.
- (c) Wrecked 7 German trucks of various kinds.
- (d) Blew 2 bridges on the CORTONA - CITTA DI CASTELLO rd.

The Germans took a serious enough view of them to send a punitive expedition, consisting of about 100 - 150 men and several armoured cars, against them on 27 June.

Since the arrival of the Allies they have continued to co-operate, in that various members have come to this office and given us all the information they had of the area still held by the Germans in the hills to the EAST of CORTONA.

By way of contrast, its members wear ordinary clothes and give their information in a normal and reasonable way, and refrain from stressing their **heroic** sufferings at every conceivable opportunity. It is also interesting that neither of these bands in the past seems to have had a great deal to do with the other. In fact, in this town are two clear instances of the divergence in the Italian partisan movement, between those who are ready to do something, even if it has to be on a small scale, and those who have used the name of partisan largely to cash in on the new order.

VEGETABLE FOODS.

Men who have to subsist on vegetable foods, such as cabbages, and especially on wild vegetables must realize that, owing to their comparatively poor food-value, large quantities must be eaten to obtain sufficient calories. On the other hand, owing to their high vitamin and mineral value, edible leaves are very wholesome food and provide much bulk, so that they satisfy the appetite. "Short commons" on this form of diet may result in better health than an equal shortage of the richer foods.

A considerable part of each day must be devoted to gathering and eating the foliage if it has to be eaten raw. Animals which subsist on it spend the greater part of their waking hours in eating, and the welfare of men living on the wild vegetation of a country will largely depend on the time they are able to set aside for this purpose, as well as in preparing and consuming the food. Men in hiding should therefore take every opportunity for collecting food and take it to their hideouts for preparing and eating. An average cabbage, weighing two lb., if eaten raw, cannot be chewed and swallowed in less than half an hour, and at least nine cabbages would be needed.

CATCHING ANIMALS.

Small Birds and Mice. - By far the best implement is the little "break-back" mouse trap obtainable at any ironmonger's. The structure can be concealed by sprinkling short pieces of dried grass, taking care to leave the spring free. It should be baited with biscuit crumbs for sparrows and finches, but for blackbirds and thrushes a large live worm imaled on the trigger is much the best bait. Being very light, the trap should be anchored to a peg in the ground with a piece of string.

Eels and Coarse Fish. The former are the more valuable and easily caught in sluggish streams. Requirements are a roach-hook mounted on gut and a short length of fine fishing-line. A stick can be cut for a rod. The hook should be baited with a worm and allowed to sink to the bottom. The line can be hitched round a small piece of stick to act as a float, and attached so as to allow the required depth.

For fish, the float should be so adjusted that the bait is just off the bottom. Special tackle for catching pike could not be included in the men's equipment. Great care should be taken of the hook and gut. They may become precious.

Rabbits and Rats. Snares set in the runs are best under the circumstances. For those who have never set snares, a demonstration is needed. One or two ready-made snares without pegs might be worth including in the equipment.

Snails may be found by "combing" hay fields with the fingers. They will be found on the stalks of the grass or on the ground. Standing hay is a rich finding-ground for snails.

Crayfish may be found by thrusting the hand into their holes at water-level, in streams with muddy banks.

Shell-fish of the sea shores. - All these shell-fish are edible. Mussels, cockles, winkles and razor-fish can all be eaten raw. The commonest shell-fish of the rocks are the limpets: these are very tough when raw, but when chopped up and boiled, with just enough water to cover them, they are quite edible and are good food. Sea urchins are very palatable.

SEAWEEEDS

In the case of necessity seaweeds should not be neglected. The commonest is the "bladder weed." This tough and unattractive, but when boiled in two waters become edible.

Ulvas (long ribbon-weeds) are quite edible. They may be eaten raw, but are better boiled like other green vegetables, the water being strained off with much of the salt.

GENERAL DIRECTIONS.

Men supplied with condensed rations, such as the 24-hour ration, to serve only for a short period, are advised to eke them out from the start as far as possible by supplementing any of the wild foods described in the list. This will offer the double advantage of accustoming them gradually to the "wild" diet and extending the period covered by the condensed rations. A look-out should at all times be kept for any of the edible weeds which can be stowed in the pack for later cooking and eating.

To skin rats, mice and birds, cut off the heads, make an incision down the centre of the breast and abdomen, just skin-deep. Then peel off the skin from centre to sides, pull the skin off the back from above downwards, cut open the belly and draw out the guts, leaving the liver behind.

PRECAUTIONS.

Water should always be boiled for two minutes if taken from ponds or ditches.

Poisonous plants. Unless a man has special knowledge of the fungi, it will be advisable to stick to mushrooms (which are easy to identify by their brown or pink under-gills).

Some of the weeds, which may have tempting leaves, are poisonous because they contain oxalic acid. These include all the docks, sorrel (too commonly eaten in salads) and the leaves of rhubarb.

Buttercups are poisonous.

Cow-parsley is an edible plant, but several others of the same order which closely resemble it are very poisonous, e.g. hemlock.

On the whole it will be advisable to stick to the edible weeds described above. Some, or all of them, are plentiful in the countryside of Europe during the summer and autumn.


Animal Food. Great care should be taken to see that the meat has not putrified, and it is advisable to eat animals fairly soon after killing so as to make sure of this. Dead animals, such as dogs found run over or horses killed in action, should only be eaten if they are still warm when found.

GERMAN COMPOSITE AIRCRAFT

It is known that the Germans have been experimenting with a composite aircraft, made up of an ME-109 mounted on the back of a JU-88. Fresh evidence supports the original PW story that the JU-88 serves as a flying bomb for use against strongly fortified land targets and capital ships. More important still, operational reports recently received, one of which is given below, show that this new combination has already been in action against a heavy Allied Naval Unit.

It is reported that the composite aircraft flies as a 3-engined bi-plane under the sole control of the pilot of the ME-109. There is no crew in the JU-88. About a mile from the target, the pilot releases his aircraft from the JU-88 which continues under power on an aimed course and at a shallow angle of descent under the control of an automatic pilot.



COMPOSITE AIRCRAFT: This visualization of the combined Me-109 and Ju-88 is not intended as an authoritative drawing of the bizarre new essay phenomenon, but as a rough idea of what it may look like. Not enough is yet known about how close to each other, and by what means the two aircraft are joined, to provide a final drawing. (The above drawing is reproduced from USSTAF Air Int Summary No 35).

Based on an angle of descent of say 15° - 20° , it is calculated that the speed of the JU-88 during its approach would be about 325 mph. The release height would be about 2,000 ft.

A new nose section, containing the explosive charge, replaces the normal nose of the JU-88. It is estimated that the weight of the complete warhead may be as high as 8,000 lb. If designed in accordance with modern German hollow-charge technique, the explosive filling could account for 4,000 lb. There is good reason to believe that the penetrative force is exceptionally high, and that the enemy believes in its ability to sink a capital ship with one hit.

In the absence of detailed info it is not possible to give a reliable estimate of the radius of action of this composite aircraft, but the possibility of the ME-109 being refuelled in flight from the JU-88 has to be considered. Unquestionably, the composite aircraft will prove very vulnerable to fight interception, and both it or its separate JU-88 component should be easy targets for AA defences.

REPORTED ATTACK ON CONVOY BY GERMAN COMPOSITE AIRCRAFT

On 24th June, 1944, an attack upon an Allied convoy is reported to have been made by a German composite aircraft. The incident was witnessed by the pilot and navigator of a Mosquito who have since been interviewed by a Technical Intelligence Officer. Their observations, with comments are given below:

The Mosquito was on patrol 25 miles west of Le Havre at 23.00 hours at an altitude of 5,000 to 6,000 ft. Visibility was excellent and a large convoy was observed about four miles to the west.

Both occupants of the Mosquito had a good view, lasting for 15 to 20 seconds, of an unusual biplane about a mile away. This had the appearance of a small aircraft attached to the top of a larger twin-engined type. It was possible to see between the two aircraft and they appeared to be connected at the trailing edges of the mainplanes. Although the Mosquito was flown on a parallel course and must have been seen, no avoiding action was taken by the composite which proceeded on a dead straight course in the direction of the convoy. Its speed was estimated to be between 200-250 m.p.h.

While the crew of the Mosquito were striving to identify the composite, the smaller aircraft lifted suddenly from the lower component, banked steeply, flew away at right angles, and was lost against the land background. The larger aircraft then turned over on its back and dived straight into the sea without showing any tendency to glide. It reached the sea in about 3 seconds (the crew were rather uncertain of the exact time taken, but stated that the aircraft did not spin). On striking the water it caused a terrific explosion and orange flash, three miles east of the convoy.

It was impossible to see if all three propellers were rotating while the two machines were attached. Although the separation of the two aircraft appeared hurried and ill-judged, there was no indication that the composite had been attacked or that any defect had developed.

The navigator was convinced that the smaller aircraft was an FW-190, but based his identification mainly on the square wing tips, and admitted that it might have been an ME-109. The navigator also thought that the lower aircraft was a JU-88, having observed a large single fin and rudder, two engines, and definitely pointed wing tips. The wing tips were clearly seen as the aircraft dived into the sea.

Comments: In view of the information already available and that the enemy have begun to use composite aircraft operationally there is little doubt that such an aircraft was seen by the crew of the Mosquito. There is no good reason why the upper member of the composite should not be an FW-190 but most of the evidence (including photo interpretation reports) points to the fact that the ME-109 has been selected for this duty. The navigator was therefore probably mistaken in identifying the fighter component as an FW-190.

In view of the German aircraft situation it seems unlikely that the newer JU-88 would be used as an expendable flying bomb when considerable numbers of JU-88's must be available which would presumably serve the purpose equally well. The JU-88 with special warhead is undoubtedly a formidable weapon if it can be brought to bear upon a suitable target. The abortive attack witnessed by the Mosquito crew, however, suggested difficulties in control which, allied to inherent vulnerability, must render success in operation extremely problematical.



2. DISCIPLINE - DRUNKENNESS

2-A

(a) Much drunkenness, with its attendant crime, is caused by failure to realise the strength of the local wine.

(b) Examination of sample bottles of ITALIAN wine shows that their alcoholic content compared with that of other drinks is as follows:-

1 litre of red wine - $\frac{1}{2}$ bottle of whiskey or $\frac{1}{2}$ bottle of Gin.
 $4\frac{1}{2}$ bottles of Cdn beer or 8 pints of
ENGLISH draught bitter (Wartime strength)

1 litre of white wine - $\frac{2}{5}$ bottle of whiskey or $\frac{2}{5}$ bottle
of gin, or $3\frac{1}{4}$ bottles of Cdn beer or
 $7\frac{1}{2}$ pints of ENGLISH draught beer (Wartime
strength).

3. SHOOTING OF CIVILIANS

3-A

1. Cases have occurred of the shooting of civilians detected in the theft of WD property. Such shooting is NOT justified.

2. Civilians detected in the commission of any ordinary offence against mil personnel or property, will be, if possible, apprehended and handed over to AMG or civilian authorities. Shooting will NOT be resorted to, unless the offence endangers the lives of mil personnel or is sabotage of a serious nature.

3. This order in no way countermands the duty of picquets, patrols and sentries to fire, after due warning as laid down, on persons failing to respond to their challenge.

4. SWIMMING - SAFETY PRECAUTIONS

1. In view of the number of fatal swimming accidents that have occurred in recent weeks the most stringent safety precautions will be enforced by all units.

2. All bathing will be in organised parties in charge of a nominated officer or NCO, who will be responsible that proper safety precautions are observed. No person may bathe except in such parties.

3. No fresh water bathing will take place until the OC unit has satisfied himself of its safety.

4. While parties are bathing, one or more strong swimmers will be detailed as life guards and, if possible, equipped with life lines.

5. No sea bathing will be permitted in rough weather.

5. No 1 CDN TOBACCO DEP

5-A

1. A Tobacco Dep has been est by the Cdn Postal Corps in ITALY to expedite delivery of cigarettes to members of the Cdn Armed Forces.

2. Individual orders will be placed in CANADA as at present, the

labels added by the Tobacco Companies and delivered to the Postal Corps in CANADA. The labels will then be flown to the Tobacco Dep in ITALY where they will be affixed to a carton of cigarettes and forwarded to the addressee.

3. It has been found necessary to standardise the size of the carton for warehousing reasons, and henceforth orders for 500 size cartons only will be accepted by the Tobacco companies.

4. A quota of 900 cigarettes per man per month has been set by the Dept of National Defence (Army) and this quota will be rigidly exercised. Cigarettes received for individuals in excess of quota will not be forwarded until they are again eligible to receive them, but a card will be forwarded to the addressee informing him that the cigarettes are on hand which cannot be delivered until a later date, as he has received his allotment for the month.

5. The present free issue from EPI will continue as at present. EPI and regt institutes will not be taken into consideration in Quota Control.

6. Cigarettes packages presently in route from CANADA will not be counted against the above quota, but will be delivered to the addressee as at present.

1-A

All ranks who have had sexual intercourse with any person will report immediately after such intercourse to an EARLY TREATMENT CENTRE for treatment. They will obtain from the ETC a certificate of treatment, giving the above data. In the event that VENERAL DISEASE is contracted, the certificate will be produced to the Medical Officer treating the case at 1 Cdn Corps Venereal Disease Treatment Centre. It will not be taken away from the patient by the Regimental Medical Officer.

2-A

In the event that a soldier, who has contracted Venereal Disease, is unable to produce a certificate of treatment, severe disciplinary action will be taken by his unit under AA Section 11, unless the records of the ETC show that the patient underwent treatment at the appropriate time and date. Habitual offenders should be tried by FGM.

3-A

Any soldier that cannot prove he underwent treatment at the appropriate time and date will be put under open arrest by the Venereal Disease Treatment Centre. If evacuated beyond the Centre, a notification will be made on his documents that he is under open arrest for an offence under AA Section 11. On discharge, he will be immediately returned to his unit for disciplinary action.

4-A

A forfeiture of pay should be awarded with or without any other punishment to cover the period spent under treatment. This award will be made under FR & I Article 149(2).

LEAVE

All personnel proceeding on leave will be paraded before Major Minshull, who will warn them of the dangers of Venereal Disease, ensure that prophylactics have been made available to them, and inform them of the disciplinary action that may be taken if they contract the disease

VEH PERMITS

All vehs leaving 5 Cdn Armd Div area will be in possession of an authority showing destination, nature of duty and date of return. Authority may be obtained from the Adj. Work tickets for outside the Bde Area will still be signed by the C.O.

With supreme disregard for his own safety and in spite of the fact that his own vehicle was loaded with high explosive mortar bombs, this NCO continued on to his destination, thereby ensuring that the platoon obtained sufficient ammunition to carry out their tasks.

The initiative and determination which this non-commissioned officer exercised in over coming every obstacle and in spite of being under heavy enemy fire, was a vital factor in the successful completion of the platoon task. His sincere conception of duty is worthy of the noblest traditions of the service."
