Instructions for Compilation and
Despatch

1. A War Diary is SECRET.
2. The War Diary takes the place of the Historical Record when on active service. (KR (Can) Para 1530). Its objects are: to supply authentic material for the history of the unit, and of the force; to furnish a historical record of operations; and to provide data upon which to base improvements in training, equipment, organization and administration.
3. Unless otherwise ordered, the original and duplicate copies are sent on the first day of the succeeding month, through the usual channels, to the AG 2nd Echelon, wherever that office may be. The triplicate copy may be held by the unit for three months and then forwarded, also through the usual channels, to AG, 2nd Echelon. In Canada all copies as above are sent through the usual channels to NDHQ; in England to Canadian Military HQ.
 - (i) District Officers Commanding will arrange to forward War Diaries to National Defence Headquarters addressed Director Historical Section, GS (War Diaries) with covering roll, in duplicate, showing unit from which received and number of copies in each case; the duplicate roll will be returned as a receipt.
 - (ii) Formations and Units in the Ottawa Area Command will forward War Diaries direct to National Defence Headquarters (addressed Director Historical Section, GS (War Diaries)).
4. Post-war disposal will be as under:—
 - Original—retained at Ottawa for historical purposes.
 - Duplicate—to British Record Office for historical purposes.
 - Triplicate—to unit for custody with unit records.
5. The War Diary will be entered up daily on MF M11 and rendered monthly in triplicate (Mohn Instr for CM 1937. App "C"). Each entry will be initialled by the officer detailed to keep the War Diary, which will be signed at the end of each month by the commander. (FSR Vol II, Sec 35, para 3 iii).

6. The following should be recorded daily as events occur:—
 - (i) Important orders, instructions, reports, messages or despatches received and issued, and decisions taken. *Original documents* should be attached as appendices to the original copy of the War Diary; *copies* should, whenever available, be attached as appendices to the duplicate and triplicate copies of the War Diary.
 - (ii) Daily map location, employment, movements and dispositions of unit headquarters and of batteries, companies, etc. March tables should be attached as appendices.
 - (iii) Important movements of officers and matters relating to the duties of each branch of the staff. A complete set of the *routine orders and instructions, Part I Orders*, issued by the unit during the month should be attached as an appendix to the original copy.
 - (iv) Detailed account of operations—to include:— Exact hour, location and circumstances of important occurrences. Movements and names of neighbouring units. Commanders of batteries, companies, etc, names of Officers and number of OR (i) engaged and (ii) battle casualties. Dispositions, activities and identity of enemy forces. Prisoners and trophies captured. Ammunition expended. Factors affecting operations, topographical and climatic. *Maps and sketches* showing dispositions of batteries, companies, etc, at important phases. The record of *communications, both written and verbal*, received or despatched during active operations as an appendix. A complete set of the *operation orders and instructions* issued during the month. Notes on conferences and *reports* rendered to higher formations, or received from lower formations, as appendices to the original copy.
 - (v) Nature and description of trenches, field works or accommodation occupied or constructed. Meteorological notes.

- (vi) Changes in establishment or strength. Names and ranks of officers and number of OR. Attachment of units and individuals. Reinforcements. *Weekly Field Returns of Officers and OR* should be attached as appendices to the original copy. *Copy of Part II Orders* should be attached to the triplicate copy only. Changes in organization, stores, transport, etc.
 7. It is essential that all copies of both text and appendices are legible. Appendices will be numbered and referenced to the text in the last column of the form. Current issues of any regimental publication should be attached.
 8. It will be found convenient at the end of each month, when the War Diary is being completed and the correspondence in unit files for the month is being reviewed and distributed (FSR Vol I, sec 171, para 3) if the material considered to be of historical value in the light of the above is attached as appendices to the original copy of the War Diary, the file title and reference number being entered in conformity with the filing system.
 9. A good war diary makes possible the accurate and detailed reconstruction of circumstances, conditions and action.
- NOTE: If monthly diary is more than one inch thick, use a second folder. If appendices are bulky, tie folder up with tape or string to make a firm package.

**UNIT OFFICE FILING SYSTEM
AND RECORDS**

"Every office will arrange for the filing and custody of its own correspondence." (FSR Vol I, Sec 171.3.)

1. *Titles and Numbering of Files*

A simple filing system adaptable for use in any military office at home or in the field is illustrated by the "List of File Titles" overleaf.

All documents handled by a unit fall into one or other of the nine categories enumerated, 1 to 9. The titles of the nine main divisions are based on British army operations, organization, administration and the regulations governing. Each title may be broken down into ten component parts or sub-titles, by adding a dash and subsidiary numbers 0 to 9. In turn each of these may be further broken down by adding a second dash and a third digit, and if necessary a third dash and a fourth digit. Thus 4-6-3 might be "Cooking Course at Kingston". According to circumstances, a fighting unit would expand the 1-3 prefix to accommodate all arms and services with which it may be concerned.

2. *Date reference*

The method outlined in FSR, Vol II, Appendix IV, will be used for all purposes, *e.g.*, 2 Feb 40.

3. *Documents for Preservation*

The monthly review of correspondence (FSR Vol I, sec 171.3) is facilitated and future confusion avoided by jacketing the material in "Category ii" (*i.e.*, "no longer required", etc) to conform with the system.

4. *Correspondence in the Field*

The functioning of the office of a formation or unit during active operations may be simplified by keeping a log or register of all orders and messages, written or verbal, received or sent during the action. This may conveniently be done by extending the use of the "Field Register of Communications Received or Despatched", (Army Form 2040, FSR Vol I, sec 171) to include verbal as well as written orders and messages in chronological order as received or sent.

Time of sending and of receipt are of importance second only to time of event, and should be entered both on the office copy of every field message or other document, and in the log or register. A carbon copy for contemporary reference of the commander or others concerned is desirable.

VI

A brief precis of written orders, reports and messages, with the sender's number, is sufficient, for they will be kept on file. But particular care is necessary in making entries of times of moves and of verbal orders, reports or conversations, by telephone or otherwise, which in the stress of action, may not otherwise be recorded on paper. In battle, operations messages dealt with by one officer may number over twenty-five per hour for several hours on end.

The record should be kept convenient to the telephone. Entries may be made by a clerk, or by the officer on duty at the telephone.

Such a record is invaluable to the commander in making appreciations of the situation during the action, and in compiling his report on the action afterwards. It is contemporary evidence of the highest quality, and therefore is of the highest historical value, and should be attached as an appendix to the original copy of the War Diary, together with the original documents sent and received.



1. DUTCH GULDENS

1. Regardless of any previous instructions that may have been issued, new type Dutch Guildens notes irrespective of denomination will be legal tender in all military and welfare institutions in HOLLAND.

2. MIL BUS SERVICES-CFN

1. Effective immediately passenger lift for each military bus will be limited to 18 personnel. This refers to all military busses operating in CFN area.

3. POSTAGRAM SERVICE-BAOR
UK and BAOR

1. A two way telegram service for use between BAOR and UK, known as BAOR Postagram Service, will start early in November. Date and rates will be given later. This service will provide a faster communication than normal post.

2. Message will be written on GPO foreign telegram form A29(available at any APO) and handed in to APO. Number, rank and name and full military address will be written on the back of the form.

3. Postagram will be transmitted from BRUSSELS and on arrival UK treated as an inland telegram. There is NO restriction on the number sent.

4. Overseas telegrams including EFMs to the British Empire other than UK, and to H M Forces in overseas commands will be accepted at APO at normal rates applying in UK.

5. There is NO service to foreign countries and NO service to or from troops in FRANCE.

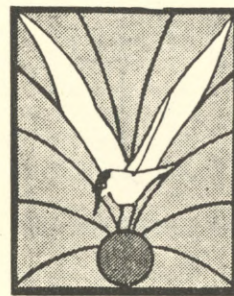

THE PRINCESS LOUISE FUSILIERS 1749-1945

In reviewing the history of The Princess Louise Fusiliers in the war of 1939-'45, it would be well to relate briefly some earlier history. In fact the regiment can lay claim to be among the oldest in Canada.

That history dates back to the 10th December 1749 when by order of Edward Cornwallis, Governor of Nova Scotia and founder of the city, ten companies formed up on the Grand Parade. Three years later the companies were formed into a regiment which saw continuous service in regular garrison duties, particularly during the war with Spain, the American Revolution, the trying times of 1793 and the war of 1812—1815.

Reorganization in 1808 gave the name of First and Second Battalions Halifax Regiments and after Confederation the regiment became The Halifax Volunteer Battalion of Infantry; in 1869 it was given the numeral "66". On the arrival in Halifax of the Marquis of Lorne and his consort H. R. H. Princess Louise the battalion formed a guard of honor at H.M. Dockyard. The following year the Princess graciously consented that the regiment be known as the 66th Princess Louise Fusiliers.

During the Riel Rebellion in the North West three companies were provided to the Halifax Provisional Battalion and in 1899—1900 more volunteers saw service in South Africa than from any other Canadian militia regiment.

In World War I the regiment found itself occupied once more with the primary role of the defence

of the approaches to Halifax and was mobilized on the 5th August 1914, and remained on active service until 31st May 1918. During this time 54 officers and 850 other ranks were supplied to the Canadian Expeditionary Force.

Reorganization in 1920 gave the regiment the name of 1st Battalion Princess Louise Fusiliers, perpetuating the 64th Battalion C.E.F. The regiment remained as an infantry battalion until 1936 when on reorganization it became a machine gun battalion bearing the name The Princess Louise Fusiliers (MG).

On 27th August 1939 the battalion was mobilized and defensive positions on the approaches to Halifax were once more manned by The Fusiliers. During this period of training and waiting the regiment did duty at Halifax, Sydney and Canso broken by brief periods of training in Aldershot and Debert, N.S.

In January 1942 the battalion was posted from coastal defence role to the 4th Canadian Armoured Division as Motor Battalion in the 4th Canadian Armoured Brigade then being assembled at Debert Camp. The winter, spring and summer of 1942 was spent in fluctuating periods of training and coast defence duties.

On 31st October 1942 the regiment sailed from Halifax, landing in Scotland on 4th November. During the period of training in England the battalion was stationed in succession at Aldershot, Box Hill near Dorking, Camberley, Mychett's Lake, Possingworth Park near Heathfield, Winchester and Eastbourne. In that period the regiment underwent various reorganizations of arm and establishment including flame throwing battalion and infantry

battalion. In August 1943 the 11th Canadian Infantry Brigade Support Group (P. L. Fus) of the 5th Canadian Armoured Division was organized with heavy 4.2 inch mortars and Vickers Medium Machine Guns as principal weapons.

The regiment sailed from England with 5th Canadian Armoured Division and landed at Naples on 10th November 1943 to join the famed Eighth Army in its triumphal march through Italy that started at Alamein.

First battle action was north of Ortona on 17 January 1944 followed successively by static positional warfare on the Arielli at Orsogna, Crecchio, Tank Village and later near Mount Cassino at St. Elia and Velerotonda.

In May the P. L. F. fought the Liri Valley engagement as a part of the Fifth Armoured Division in the breakout from the Hitler Line made by First Canadian Infantry Division and fought engagements on the Melfa River, and at Ceprano, Pofi and Arnara.

In August the regiment moved northwards and participated in the lengthy Eighth Army push through the Gothic Line into the Lombardi Plains which ended in January 1945 on the Senio and Reno Canals bordering Lake Comacchio. In this lengthy action such place names and rivers as Foglia River, Tomba de Pesaro, Conca River, Coriana Ridge, Uso, Fiumicino (Rubicon), Savio, Bevano, Montone, Lamone, Naviglio, Vecchio, Senio, Conventello, San Alberto and Reno marked the location of successful engagements.

This period from August 1944 to January 1945 constitutes perhaps the proudest chapter in the

history of the regiment. During this phase the unit fought as two groups, the 11th and 12th Brigade Support Groups, but were joined into one large force for the greater battles. It was during such engagements that personnel of the PLF established a lasting reputation through their skillful and effective employment of mortars and machine guns.

The unit sailed from Leghorn in February and landed at Marseilles in the move of 1st Canadian Corps from Italy to the Low Countries. In March the regiment, then reduced to one group, the 11th Canadian Independent Machine Gun Company, went into action in March on "The Island" on the Neder Rijn south of Arnhem and fought in the spectacular armoured dash through Arnhem, Otterloo to the Zuider Zee. Garrison duty in Friesland followed and later the regiment participated in the liberation of the port of Delfzijl which saw the capitulation of the Germans in North West Holland. The Princess Louise Fusiliers were in the line when the cease fire sounded.

This sketch is necessarily a brief one and space does not permit to describe in detail the superhuman tasks performed by all ranks of pushing their weapons forward under conditions of rain, sleet, mud and baking sun in the vineyards, plains and mountains of Italy and the rain sodden dykelands of Holland.

It does, however, serve to recall to all ranks the place names of bygone battles and the sacrifices of beloved comrades whilst serving in the mortar and machine gun pits of the Princess Louise Fusiliers; theirs was the greatest of all sacrifices — the supreme sacrifice.

OH VALIANT HEARTS.

O valiant hearts, who to your glory came
Through dust of conflict and through battle-flame;
Tranquil you lie, your knightly virtue proved,
Your memory hallowed, in the Land you loved.
